Thurgoona Bioblitz Sam Niedra

The inaugural Thurgoona Bioblitz 2012 is co-ordinated by the Slopes2Summit (S2S) partnership and the Woolshed Thurgoona Landcare Group. It is part of a Federal Government 'Caring For Our Country' Community Action Grant.

The Thurgoona Bioblitz 2012 is a community event involving surveys of wildlife across a number of sites throughout Thurgoona. The surveys will focus mostly on animals, particularly targeting birds, mammals, reptiles, and amphibians. The aim is to engage the community in fun and meaningful activities that raise awareness and increase appreciation for the many wonderful native animals and habitats in the Thurgoona area. The surveys will include nestbox checks and spotlighting for the Squirrel Glider, one of

the region's most significant native animals.

The Thurgoona Bioblitz 2012 will be assisted by ecologists from Charles Sturt University, Australian National University and others, who will be helping design the surveys and act as survey leaders, and generally enrich the experience of participants. Fauna observations recorded during the event will be fed into the Atlas of Living Australia (ALA), using a web based portal being especially designed for Thurgoona by S2S in partnership with the ALA, and will contribute to the knowledge base of native fauna in the area.

\$19 400 of new Community Action Grant funds

The Thurgoona Woolshed Landcare group applied for, and recieved, a 2012 Community Action Grant from the Federal Government program Caring for our Country. This follows on from the previous CAG grant that is supporting the BioBlitz. The 2012 grant will allow us to complete two on ground projects.

The first involves erecting protective fencing around dams on the National Environment Centre. These dams are special because they are home to a small amphibian the Sloane's Froglet, one of the district's threatened species. Fencing will protect the dam's verges from trampling and grazing, increasing the habitat for the froglet to call and, hopefully, breed.

The second is community revegetation works in the Woolshed Creek /Thurgoona area in spring 2012 (more on this later in the year).

Any remaining funds will support information sharing.

Nest box homes at Trout Farm Rd

The Lucas Family installed 17 nest boxes on their property in 2007 as part of a Woolshed landcare activity. These were located mainly as bird nest sites but some were placed to provide a corridor down to the Murray River.

Boxes were inspected the following year in 2008, and again recently. In 2008, 4-5 boxes showed evidence of use by parrots, bees and maybe gliders but the vast majority were unused (apart for Sawfly larvae).

Boxes were recently inspected, and results again recorded, prior to Easter 2012. Results this time were much more exciting. Only 3 boxes showed no signs of activity. Results in boxes were as follows:

- 2 x Possums present, and 3 x evidence of probably possum
- 1x Parrot nest/feathers and 1 x Parrot feathers with frogs x 4
 - $2 \ge Gecko(1)$

- 4 x curved nest (Glider?)
- 2 x Antechinus
- 1 x rat family

A possum was also present in a "Round Up" drum we had recently placed in a tree. With this activity, particularly the gliders, we are keen to place more boxes adjacent the River where hollows are in short supply.

We have also been noting the bird species at our block and have reached the high 80's. If you would like to know more or swap stories of wildlife at your place catch up with Kaye or Stuart.
